

Jilles and his friend Misha Collins, who is a famous actor in the USA, planned a meeting with me later in the month. It was all very exciting with much to catch up on as the previous exploits of these two had helped DSA over several of its earlier years specifically with funding and the huge crowdfunding campaign before the passing of The Late Fiona Sargeant. However, and most unfortunately for me, this meeting was not meant to happen. In the early hours of the 13<sup>th</sup> of August, I drove myself up to the Montagu Hospital. It was out of complete desperation, and I felt exhausted due to a complete lack of sleep. My heart condition had deteriorated in some way. Every time I managed to get close to sleep and began to feel myself dropping off, I would be woken again by pains in the chest and heart palpitations. The body was forcing me to stay awake. Later that day the hospital managed to find me a bed, and I was checked in. I had no idea that I would only be discharged almost a month later. With deadlines and other important events pending the staff and board of DSA had to come together to help and I thank every one of you for all your wonderful help and effort.

All dance events and meetings with Gilles for example now shifted to Nqaba who did an excellent job of getting things done and keeping everything under control.

Nqaba also met with Gilles and Misha and they managed to do a lot of filming. The hope is that Misha will use his crowdfunding contacts to pull of another campaign. We sure hope so.
