### The Dancescape South Africa Report for March 2025

Dancescape South Africa (DSA) continues to facilitate daily dance classes in March of 2025 (2.00pm – 6.00pm Venue Zolani Hope Centre – Mantlane Road Zolani Ashton) engaging children in beginner and senior dance sessions. We currently employ the services of a resident teacher, an assistant teacher, a general assistant, and a director. Thanks to the support of all those who have donated to our project we are able to preserve the Fiona Sargeant legacy. Our top priority is to facilitate classes in a safe environment for both teacher and learners and to provide an extramural activity which is good for both mind and body.

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### The Directors Report:

The month of March was an exciting month for us. It featured two outings to the Artscape Theatre, two trips to McGregor for Saturday classes and plenty of teaching in between. Cape Ballet Africa makes its debut at Artscape Opera House from 25 – 27 March with a new triple bill, BREATHWORDS.


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BREATHWORDS features two choreographies by international creators, presented alongside an expanded version of South African choreographer, Kirsten Isenberg's Reverie, an ethereal masterpiece set to Rachmaninoff's Piano Concerto No. 2, which captivated audiences last year. Maggie Foyer for Dance Europe praised Reverie as 'a ballet of gentle beauty."

The line-up also features the world premiere of whispers from within, choreographed by renowned Dutch choreographer Wubkje Kuindersma, set to Summer and Spring of Vivaldi's Four Seasons recomposed by Max Richter.

Completing the programme is excitingly **Nacho Duato's** *REMANSO*, a project made possible with the invaluable support of the **Embassy of Spain in Pretoria and the Spanish Consulate in Cape Town.**




Above: Cape Ballet Africa's production call "Breathwords"
