The 2nd Quarter Report for Dancescape South Africa from April to June 2025

Daily dance classes continued during school term times throughout April to June of 2025 (2.00pm – 6.00pm Venue Zolani Hope Centre – Mantlane Road Zolani Ashton) engaging children in beginner and senior dance sessions. Dancescape South Africa (DSA) was able, through the kind donations of individuals and organizations to employ 2 full time teachers and 5 trainees. We were also able to employ the services of a director / administrator and a general assistant. We thank all who have made it possible to preserve the Fiona Sargeant Legacy and to uplift the disadvantaged youth of our country through dance.

This was a particularly short month with only 12 official school days in it. The students returned to school on the 8th after their easter holidays. We managed to squeeze in another 2 days of classes and some of the students attended the Saturday classes in McGregor as well.


We have been hearing good things about Chuma Mathiso who is currently studying with the Alonzo King LINES program in the USA. Chuma began his dance career with DSA.

Finally, the dancers pulled another piece out of the bag, but this one was unrehearsed and yet they managed to pull it off.

I must also report that he has over the last year or so excelled in his dancing, and I believe he will no doubt go far. On the 1st of July Solima and I attended his visa interview in Cape Town. It was approved and he is very excited about travelling to New York and attending the Manhattan Youth Ballet intensive. We wish him all the best.

On the 18th of June Dancescape had its Annual General Meeting. It was a good meeting and all went well. Many thanks to our board of trustees for their loyal support and leadership.

The school brock up for the mid-year winter holidays on the 27th of June and will only reopen on the 22nd of July.
