

On the 7<sup>th</sup> of August, Solima Mathiso travelled to New York where he spent the rest of August attending a dance intensive hosted by the Manhattan Youth Ballet. It was a wonderful opportunity, and I really believe that he has learnt a lot from it. A wonderful article was published on their front page of the Burger, showing Solima and his brother Chuma who are both very much involved in the dance. A foreign media group called Routers also interviewed the brothers and followed up with Solima once he had returned. They are hoping to make a documentary and publish articles about this wonderful story.

Earlier in the month I received a surprise email from the secretary to Jiles Dulley. Jiles and his friend Misha Collins, who is a famous actor in the USA, planned a meeting with me later in the month. It was, however, not meant to be, as in the early hours of the 13<sup>th</sup> of August, I drove myself to the Montagu Hospital, out of complete desperation, due to my heart condition deteriorating. Later that day the hospital found me a bed, and I was checked in. I had no idea that I would only be discharged about a month later. With deadlines and other important events pending the staff and board of DSA had to come together to help and I thank every one of you for all your wonderful help and effort.

All dance events and meetings with Giles for example, now shifted to Nqaba who did an excellent job of getting things done and keeping everything under control.

## September 2025:

I remained in hospital until the 10<sup>th</sup> of September. I had to return to hospital for a check-up on the 17<sup>th</sup> and then on the 29<sup>th</sup> where I was transported to Worcester again for some procedures on my heart. That day was very tough as I had shock treatment on my heart in an attempt to stimulate certain parts to work properly again. Unfortunately, it didn't work, and the doctor explained that it may have been too long and there was no guarantee that it would in the first place. However, it was at least an attempt but very painful.

The only event to report on was the Heritage age Day event on the 24<sup>th</sup> of September. However, there was some controversy about this event as Nqaba and Aviwe both reported that they felt that that DSA had been used and that the production was far from professional. I hope to discuss these issues with the management of these productions before the next event.

they were and to review the rest of the year. Then I had a meeting with Francois Tradoux. Francois had been shortlisted, for want of a better way to put it, to join the DSA board. Furthermore, the meeting was a casual way to view his temperament, and his feelings about directing DSA in the capacity of administrator. Many dance companies and institutions use this method of administration.

After not seeing the students for so long and really missing them a luncheon was held on Saturday the 27<sup>th</sup> of September. It was a lovely get-together with the trainee teachers attending. Thank you to Patricia for cooking so deliciously and for Aviwe and Nqaba organizing the event.
